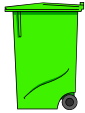

VILLAGE'S TRASH & RECYCLING SERVICE



Veolia Environmental Services provides roll out trash and recycling carts to all residential households. Collection is every Thursday; Friday during a holiday week. Carts must be placed curbside by 7:00 a.m. on pick-up day.

Carts must face the street as indicated by the arrow, must be fully accessible, and be placed with a minimum of three feet of space between carts and/or other obstacles. Recycling will be collected only every other week. Recycling collection dates are posted on the Village website under the Navigation Menu - "Recycling Collection" link and can also be found on the Village's Government Cable Access Channel 25. Information is also available at Village Hall and Oscar Grady Library. All recyclable materials (paper, plastic, glass, metal) can be placed in the same recycle cart - there is no need to separate. Residents are urged not to place trash loosely in trash carts as this will lead to odor and pest problems as well as blowing materials when the carts are emptied. Any trash or recyclable materials placed curbside in any container other than the carts will not be collected.

Large Item Pick-up Service: To dispose of large items, such as furniture, mattresses, and appliances, you must arrange for special pick-up by Veolia or take items to the Veolia drop-off site at 803 North River Road, West Bend. There is a fee for large item disposal. Contact Veolia directly (1-800-387-0949) for prices and information.

DO YOU HAVE A PERMIT?

Residents are reminded that a permit is required before any construction work is done on a home. Check with Village Hall for requirements and fee information. Any work performed prior to acquiring a permit will result in the fee tripling per Village Ordinance.

DOG AND CAT LICENSE RENEWALS

All Village of Saukville residents owning a cat or dog that is older than 6 months are required by Village Ordinance to purchase a pet license. 2010 licenses can be purchased between December 15, 2009 and March 31, 2010. A late penalty will be imposed for pet license processing after March 31, 2010.

Village Ordinance limits each household to 3 adult pets.

Dog License fees:

\$8.00 spayed/neutered; \$10.00 not spayed/neutered
\$5.00 late penalty after March 31, 2010.

Cat License fees:

\$5.00 spayed/neutered; \$7.00 not spayed/neutered
\$3.00 late penalty after March 31, 2010.

Economic Development Updates



New Commercial:

Manufacturing

Rock Machinery Co., LLC, 740 North Dekora Woods Boulevard, has completed a 6,000 square foot building. Occupancy is expected September, 2009.

Retail

620 East Green Bay Avenue - Conservancy Court

New activity in Conservancy Court includes Saukville Subs (formerly Quiznos Sub) and a Sherwin-Williams paint store.

150 South Foster Drive - Rhythm 'n Brews plans to open by the end of August, 2009 in the former Bublitz Restaurant building. It represents a complete building renovation and a most welcome addition to the Village's hospitality and entertainment district known as Foster Commons. Unique menu and bar selections combined with live entertainment will make this a popular Ozaukee County destination.

Residential:

Milan Estates - This planned residential development will create a campus atmosphere with two levels of senior housing options: Three two-family condominium buildings for independent senior living and one larger 18-unit building for seniors desiring assisted living without sacrificing high standards for amenities. The project is located on the corner of Milan Drive and Foster Drive, in the Village's Foster Commons planned development district, and currently on hold pending financing.

Cedar-Sauk Meadows - There were two new housing starts this quarter. Only one lot is left.

Briarknoll Condominiums - Ozaukee Excavating, Inc., is constructing a new 18-unit duplex town home style condominium project at 516 Briarknoll Court. Commencement of construction will begin as market conditions allow.

CURBSIDE CHIPPING

- Curbside branch chipping runs every Monday thru Oct. 26th.
- 3" maximum branch diameter.
- Cut ends facing the street. Place in parkway (area between the sidewalk and curb). No stumps or compost.
- Pick-up starts at 6:30 a.m. on Mondays. The crew will make only one pass per side of the street per chipping event.
- DO NOT place branches on the sidewalk or street where they would interfere with pedestrians or vehicle traffic.
- DO NOT place branches at curbside sooner than the preceding weekend.
- Limit of 20 minutes per address (duplexes considered a single address) after which a \$25 fee will be charged to the property owner for each additional 20 minutes at the owner's request.

YARD WASTE (COMPOST) DISPOSAL

- Includes garden waste, leaves, lawn rakings, and small tree or bush stumps.
- Place in bags, buckets, or other suitable containers and bring to the Compost Disposal Site at the Public Works Garage.
- VILLAGE RESIDENTS ONLY. Proof of residency may be requested.
- DO NOT put lawn clippings or garden waste in the street.
- NO BRANCHES/BRUSH drop-off at the compost site.
- Dates and hours of operation are listed below.

Wednesday morning hours have been eliminated.

Note: There will be NO FALL CLEAN-UP DUMPTER.

HOUSEHOLD HAZARDOUS MATERIALS DISPOSAL

Household hazardous materials are typically comprised of paints, pesticides, waste fuel, anti-freeze, and typical household cleaners. These materials must NOT be placed in the trash. They can be taken to the Ozaukee County Hazardous Waste Collection Site (information below). Fees will be charged on a per pound basis.

LEAF COLLECTION

- Curbside leaf collection runs **October 1st through November 30th**. No guaranteed or scheduled pick-up.
- Leaf piles must be curbside with **no brush or plant materials** in the piles.
- Residents are encouraged to bring all organic material to the DPW Compost Disposal Site prior to November 14th during designated times.



STREET TREES

- Street trees are those trees planted and maintained by the Village in the street parkways (between the sidewalk and curb).
- Homeowners are urged not to attempt pruning the trees and to use care with string trimmers around the base. Contact the DPW if your tree needs attention.
- Please DO NOT plant any personal trees in the parkway unless approved by the Public Works Superintendent.
- Trees are not sign posts. DO NOT attach objects with nails, staples, screws, wire, or rope. This may injure or kill the tree.
- Persons who intentionally damage, kill, or remove street trees are liable for their replacement. On average, a new street tree costs from \$250-\$350.
- Homeowners can help by watering newly planted trees for the first few years until the tree becomes established especially during dry conditions (5 gallons of water/ week.)
- Street trees are replaced on a rotating basis. Not all dead or damaged trees can be replaced in one season. They will be replaced as soon as possible.
- The Village of Saukville is a 20-year member of Tree City USA, a national organization that recognizes communities for their efforts to expand and improve their urban forest inventories.



STORM SEWER

During River Fest activities this spring, over 200 storm sewer inlets were painted and over 400 leaflets distributed reminding residents not to dump waste onto streets as they drain to the Milwaukee River. Many thanks to Saukville Boy Scout Troop #868 and the many community volunteers who assisted with the effort.



Do not place your yard waste, leaves, or grass clippings in the street. This clogs the storm sewers requiring the expenditure of tax dollars to clean them and degrades the water quality of the river. Localized flooding can also result when storm sewer inlets are blocked with these materials during heavy rainfalls. The Village provides a drop-off site for these materials. Please make the effort to haul them there.

FIRE HYDRANT FLUSHING

The Saukville Water Department will be flushing hydrants throughout the Village between 8:30 a.m. and 2:30 p.m. **October 12th through October 23rd.** There may be some discoloration in your water during this process. This is iron and is not harmful. It is recommended that you do not do laundry if your water is discolored. If you forget and your clothes have a reddish appearance, **DO NOT DRY THE CLOTHES**; rather rewash in cold water to remove the discoloration. Running the tap for a short period of time will clear the lines after the flushing in your area is completed.



HIGH WATER BILLS AND WATER LEAKS IN HOMES

Your water bills are determined by Saukville Water Utility staff reading your water meter. When your water bill becomes higher than normal, there is usually a leak in your home. 95% of all leaks are toilets and most times you cannot hear the leak. It is recommended that you check your toilets every six months to make sure they are not leaking water. Place a drop of natural food coloring in the tank. Check it in 30 minutes. If color appears in the bowl, it is leaking water. The toilet most likely leaking is the toilet rarely used. This is also a good time to operate all of your valves in your home and to start reading your meter weekly to make sure you have no leaks and that you are only billed for the water you use.



HOW YOU CAN SAVE WATER

Water conservation saves you money and makes an important contribution to a better future. Here's how to get started:

- **Stop Leaks.** Check appliances and outdoor systems, such as sprinklers, for leaks. Get to know your water meter - it provides important information about consumption and leaks. Common leaks waste 10% of the water used in many homes.
- **Replace Old Toilets.** Toilet flushing is the top water user in the home. If you haven't replaced your toilets in 10 years or more, you'll benefit from the new high efficiency models.
- **Buy an Efficient Clothes Washer.** Washers are the second largest water user in the home. New "Energy-Star" certified models may use 50% less water and energy per load. For more information, go to the Energy Star website at www.energystar.gov.
- Visit www.h2ouse.org for an array of water-saving tips - from the EPA and the California Urban Water Conservation Council - that can be applied anywhere in the U.S.

MEDICATIONS

Please do not discard old medications by flushing them down the toilet or throwing them in the trash. Save them in their original containers in a safe place. The Ozaukee County Public Health Department offers a Medication Take Back Program periodically throughout the year where old medications and prescriptions, including pet medications, can be disposed of safely. This service is for Ozaukee County residents and is free of charge. Watch the newspaper and Village Cable Station 25 for information on future medication take back dates or call the Ozaukee County Public Health Department at 284-8170 for more information.



SUMMER SEWER CREDIT

The Summer Sewer Credit began July 1, 2009 and will **run through September 30, 2009.** The water meters will all have been read by September 30th and we will then go back to billing sewer consumption as normal usage. If you have any questions regarding this credit, please call Village Hall at 284-9423 or the Wastewater Treatment Plant at 284-3185.



WATER SOFTENERS

The Village of Saukville Wastewater Department would like residents to consider buying an on-demand water softener when a new one is needed or an old one is replaced. The DNR would like the Village of Saukville to lower its chloride output into the Milwaukee River. By using an on-demand water softener, which only regenerates based on the volume of water used, you will be saving money which, in turn, uses less salt and water thus reducing the chlorides coming into the Wastewater Plant.

UTILITY BILLING PAYMENT OPTION

The Village offers a credit card payment option for payment of utility bills. You can pay in person at Village Hall to utilize this service or use a secure link through the Village website (there is a charge for the website service). Also available is **automatic withdrawal** from your checking or savings account. Your quarterly payment can be deducted automatically from your selected account on the 25th of the billing month. Go to www.village.saukville.wi.us to download the form to sign up for automatic payment. Avoid the hassle of writing checks and worrying about late fees by signing up for auto pay today!



SUMP PUMPS

Please remember to check your sump pump and make sure it is hooked up correctly to the sump pump discharge lateral and **not** to the sanitary sewer system. Per Village Ordinance, it is illegal to hook-up or discharge storm water or clear water into the Village's sanitary sewer lines. Since all discharges to the sanitary sewer end up at the treatment plant, this creates additional problems to properly process the wastewater for eventual discharge to the river. WHAT CAN I DO TO PREVENT MERCURY POLLUTION?

Mercury is being phased out of many retail products sold throughout the country. As a consumer, educate yourself; do not purchase mercury-containing items if a substitute item is available. When an item containing mercury is purchased, dispose of it properly when it becomes waste. Why be concerned?



- Mercury is toxic to the nervous system.
- Unborn children are most at risk from methyl mercury poisoning.

Exposure to extreme levels of mercury can result in shakiness, tremors, numbness in fingers and toes, loss of muscle control, memory loss, and kidney disease in children and adults. If you have further questions or concerns, please call the Ozaukee County Public Health Department at 284-8170. Ask for the Environmental Health Specialist.

"LOOKING FOR SALVATION AT THE DAIRY QUEEN" BY SUSAN GREGG GILMORE - WEDNESDAY, SEPTEMBER 23RD, 6:30 P.M.

Sometimes you have to return to the place where you began to arrive at the place where you belong. It's the early 1970's. The town is Ringold, Georgia, has a population of 1923, one traffic light, one Dairy Queen, and one Catherine Grace Cline. Every Saturday afternoon she sits at the Dairy Queen eating Dilly Bars and plotting her getaway to the big city of Atlanta. Intelligent, charming, and utterly readable, the novel marks the debut of a talented new literary voice.

"THE SILVER SWAN" BY BENJAMIN BLACK -
