FROM THE VILLAGE PRESIDENT...

Dear Friends:

Earlier this year, as in past years, I presented the "State of the Village" Power Point presentation to the Saukville Chamber of Commerce and the Port Washington-Saukville Rotary Club. In each case, the information regarding growth and activity in Saukville during 2008 was well received. Folks are interested in our development and plans for the future.

Following is a brief synopsis of the facts as presented on slides which featured gears moving and working together as the visual enhancement:

The gears that move Saukville forward are always functioning whether the end product is visible or behind the scenes. Saukville's Village Board and Management Team use times like this to work on infrastructure development and vision for the future. Then, when the economy shows signs of recovery, we are positioned to move forward ahead of the others ... poised for "success".

We continue to infuse the Character Counts! initiative into all aspects of life. This program is a coalition among government, the business community, special interest groups and the school district to fortify all of us with the six pillars of character: Trustworthiness, Respect, Responsibility, Fairness, Caring and Citizenship.

Sauk Technologies was named "Business of the Year" by the Ozaukee, Waukesha and Washington County Workforce Development Board. This award is presented to a business that has demonstrated commitment to job training and retention.

CCP, in cooperation with the Village of Saukville and the Saukville Chamber of Commerce, hosted its first Sustainability Forum in 2008. The purpose of this event was to offer insights into how CCP operates respecting the triple bottom line: Environment, Community/Societal and Economic.

Saukville's Dairy Queen has a new owner by the name of Fourteen Foods, the largest Dairy Queen franchise owner in the country. Among their corporate goals is a personal code of conduct to guide operations.

Protanic, Inc., at 650 North Progress Drive, is a new business that specializes in testing the integrity and safety of underground storage tanks. Their facility houses business offices and training facilities.

Rock Machinery Company, LLC, will be located at 740 North Dekora Woods Boulevard. Their building will house a sales office and distributorship for rock crushing machinery.

Bonsai Pet, at 301 West Dekora Street, is the latest addition to the fine grooming services offered to the pets who live in the area.

Chamber President, Russ Lund, owns and operates Cornerstone Professional Services, a small business consulting firm. Russ offers new ideas for controlling costs and assistance with goal setting and business objectives.

Chicago-based Harris Bank is a new addition to our area. For Sauk-

ville that means Harris now owns the Grafton State Bank branch. The changes implemented result in significant improvements in the level of service provided to customers.

The Village's 2035 Comprehensive Plan document was recently approved. Its purpose is to establish an urban development strategy/policy to guide future growth and development over the next two decades.

In 2008 the Village's Comprehensive Outdoor Recreation Plan was approved. This document offers us a tool for effective planning needed to measure the future demand for parks and open spaces. The CORP qualifies us for matching grant funds through the DNR.

Saukville's Utility Department, utilizing Rawson Contractors, took a proactive approach to future development by installing a new gravity fed sewer line which services the Village East of I43.

Saukville's new Police Department building is nearing completion. While not "green" as such, it has a clear story which offers the lobby 360 degrees of daylight. Lots of windows offer natural light in the offices. This project has a planned life expectancy of 20-25 years. It is 19,500 square feet in size and is built in the prairie style. It houses office and storage space, locker and shower facilities, a multipurpose room, courtroom, vehicle storage, sally port, booking, interrogation spaces and evidence staging and storage.

Approval has been given to a development on South Foster Drive which will feature three town home condominium duplexes for independent living seniors and one 18-unit Community Based Residential Facility for dependent care living. Construction should begin soon.

At this point in the presentation, I took attendees on a tour of the Village looking to the future. We called it a "What If Tour" and looked at vacant land and possible uses for it.

All in all, we viewed an update of our inclusive and progressive ideas for growth as well as suggestions for the future. The goal was to stimulate conversation and the sharing of ideas. We know we can make these developments happen. It just takes all of the gears meshing together and working harder than we have in the past.

Now, as we move forward in 2009, please know that the Village's Management Team continues to look for ways in which Saukville can qualify for any Federal Stimulus Dollars available. There are many specifications, but we will continue to study them ... stay tuned.

I want to personally thank the Saukville Lions Club for purchasing a new Character Counts! banner for the Village. In addition, my sincere "thank you" to the Village staff for their hard work through this past winter. Also, the spring election will offer us new faces on the Village Board. We thank Tim Bartoszewski and John Schantz for their past service and offer our best wishes to them.

Please enjoy the warmer weather and longer days afforded by Daylight Savings Time.

VILLAGE'S TRASH & RECYCLING PROVIDER

Effective January 1, 2009, the Village moved to the cart system for trash and recycle disposal. Veolia Environmental Services provided a 96-gallon roll out trash and recycling cart to all residential households. Collection will continue to be on Thursdays (Fridays during a holiday week). Carts must be placed curbside by 7:00 a.m. on pick-up day. **Carts must face the street as indicated by the arrow, must be fully accessible, and be placed with a minimum of three feet of space between carts and/or other obstacles.** Recycling will be collected only every other week. Recycling collection dates are posted on the Village website under the Navigation Menu - "Recycling Collection" link, and can also be found on the Village's Government Cable Access Channel 25. Information is also available at Village Hall and Oscar Grady Library. All recyclable materials (paper, plastic, glass, metal) can be placed in the same recycle cart - there is no need to separate. Residents are urged not to place trash loosely in trash carts as this will lead to odor and pest problems as well as blowing materials when the carts are emptied. Any trash or recyclable materials placed curbside in any container other than the carts will not be collected.



Large item pick-up service has not changed. To dispose of large items, such as furniture, mattresses, and appliances, you still need to arrange for special pick-up by Veolia or take items to the Veolia drop-off site at 803 North River Road, West Bend. There is a fee for large item disposal. Contact Veolia directly (1-800-387-0949) for prices and information.

Such signs must comply with traffic visibility requirements and are not permitted in Village parks or median areas. Improperly placed signs will be confiscated. There is a convenience fee of 2.75% for credit card use and a flat fee of \$2.75 for e-checks. We also offer **automatic withdrawal** from your checking or savings account. FIRST QUARTER 2009 DEVELOPMENT UPDATE

New Commercial:

Manufacturing:

Protanic, Inc., is a business specializing in testing the integrity and safety of underground storage tanks. The new 5,000 square foot building located at 658 North Progress Drive is now open and the business is doing well.

Rock Machinery Company, LLC, has purchased a three-acre parcel at 740 North Dekora Woods Boulevard and has begun constructing a 6,000 square foot building expected to be completed by September, 2009.

Retail:

Conservancy Court - 620 East Green Bay Avenue

New activity in Conservancy Court includes some relocations within the shopping center to accommodate space needs of existing tenants – Curves and I.E. Franks. New businesses include an Edward Jones office and a new anchor store soon to be announced.

Residential:

Milan Estates

This planned residential development will create a campus atmosphere with two levels of senior housing options: Three two-family condominium buildings for independent senior living and one larger 18-unit building for seniors desiring assisted living without sacrificing high standards for amenities. The project is located on the corner of Milan Drive and Foster Drive in the Village's Foster Commons planned development district. Anticipated completion is December, 2009.

Pheasant Grove Subdivision – Sold out.

Cedar-Sauk Meadows Subdivision – Three new housing starts this quarter. Only four lots left. These lots represent the last available, immediately buildable single family lots in the Village.

Briarknoll Condominiums – Ozaukee Excavating, Inc., is constructing a new 18-unit duplex town home style condominium project at 516 Briarknoll Court. Commencement of construction will begin as market conditions allow.

CURBSIDE CHIPPING-COMPOST-SPRING DUMPSTER

The Village chipping crew will begin touring the Village **starting April 6th and continuing every Monday through October 26th**. PLEASE stack branches (3" maximum diameter) neatly on the parkway (area between the sidewalk and curb), with the butt ends of the branches facing the street, by 7:00 a.m. on Monday mornings. DO NOT place branches on the sidewalk or street. DO NOT place branches at curbside sooner than the immediate preceding weekend. We DO NOT chip tree stumps. The chipping crew is limited to 20 minutes per address, after which a \$25.00 fee is charged for each additional 20 minutes at the property owner's request. The owner will be billed for the additional time beyond the first 20 minutes. The crew will make only one pass per side of the street per chipping event. There will be NO BRUSH DROP-OFF accepted at the Compost Site. A list of acceptable items can be obtained at the drop-off site or by calling Village Hall at 284-9423.

YARD WASTE (COMPOST) DISPOSAL

How do you get rid of garden waste, leaves and lawn rakings from your spring yard clean-up? Wisconsin DNR strongly recommends that these materials NOT be placed in the street at any time. Place them in bags, buckets or other suitable containers and bring them to the compost drop-off site at the Public Works Garage.

HOUSEHOLD HAZARDOUS MATERIALS DISPOSAL

Household hazardous materials are typically comprised of paints, pesticides, waste fuel, anti-freeze and typical household cleaners. These materials must NOT be placed in the trash. They can be taken to the Ozaukee County Hazardous Waste Collection Site (information below). Fees will be charged on a per pound basis.

DISPOSAL OF CONSTRUCTION MATERIALS

It is the responsibility of the contractor or homeowner to provide for the storage and disposal of construction materials. Waste materials must be stored in a manner to keep them from view, prevent the attraction of vermin and keep light materials from blowing in the wind. **OPEN BURNING OF CONSTRUCTION WASTE IS PROHIBITED IN THE VILLAGE!** The spring clean-up dumpster is not for the disposal of more than one cubic yard total for any construction project. Likewise, the curbside trash pick-up provided by Veolia Environmental Services is not for construction waste disposal other than small amounts.



MEDICINE COLLECTION DAY

The Village's Wastewater System has joined forces with the counties of Ozaukee, Milwaukee, Racine, and Washington to collect unwanted prescription medicines. Discarding medicines by flushing them down the toilet or throwing them away can result in abnormalities in the reproductive cycles of fish and possibly contribute to the development of drug resistant germs. On **April 18, 2009 from 9:00 a.m. to 1:00 p.m.**, please bring your old medicines to the Ozaukee County Highway Department at 410 South Spring Street, Port Washington, for proper disposal.



You Can Bring: Prescription and over-the-counter medications, ointments, creams, sprays, inhalers, vials, and pet medications.

Do Not Bring: Illegal drugs, biohazardous material, needles/sharps, personal care products (shampoo, soaps, lotions, sunscreens), household hazardous waste (paint, pesticides, oil, gas).

FIRE HYDRANT FLUSHING

The Saukville Water Department will be flushing hydrants throughout the Village weekdays between 8:00 a.m. and 3:00 p.m. **April 6th through April 17th.** There may be some discoloration in your water during this process. This is iron and is not harmful. We recommend that you do not do laundry if your water is discolored. If you forget and your clothes have a reddish appearance, **DO NOT DRY THE CLOTHES;** rather rewash in cold water to remove the discoloration. Running the tap for a short period of time will clear the lines after the flushing in your area is completed.



SUMMER SEWER CREDIT

The Summer Sewer Credit **begins July 1, 2009** and runs through September 30, 2009. During this billing period, your third quarter **SEWER ONLY** billing cannot be higher than the second quarter

billing. Please do not start watering your lawn in May or June if you do not understand the Sewer Credit. If you have any questions regarding this Credit, please call Village Hall.

HIGH WATER BILLS AND WATER LEAKS IN HOMES

Your water bills are determined by Saukville Utility staff reading your water meter. When your water bill becomes higher than normal, there is usually a leak in your home. When your water bill is high, check your toilets. 95% of all leaks are toilets and most times you cannot hear the leak. The toilet most likely leaking is the toilet rarely used. This is also a good time to operate all of your valves in your home and start reading your meter weekly. This way you can make sure there are no leaks in your home so that you are only billed for the water you use.



SUMP PUMPS

Please remember to check your sump pump and make sure it is hooked up correctly. Sump pump water should discharge into the storm sewer lateral or onto your property and not into the sanitary sewer system. Per Village Ordinance, it is illegal to hook-up or discharge storm water or clear water into the Village's sanitary sewer lines. Since all discharges to the sanitary sewer end up at the treatment plant, this creates additional problems to properly process the wastewater for eventual discharge into the river. If you have any questions, please call the Wastewater Utility at 284-3185.

WATER SOFTENERS

The Wastewater Department would like residents to consider buying an on-demand water softener when a new softener is needed or an old one is replaced. The DNR would like the Village to lower its chloride output into the Milwaukee River. By using an on-demand water softener, which only regenerates based on the volume of water used, you will be saving money which, in turn, uses less salt and water, thus reducing the chlorides coming into the Wastewater Plant. This is a win-win option for all parties.

WHAT CAN I DO TO PREVENT MERCURY POLLUTION?

Mercury is being phased out of many retail products sold throughout the country. As a consumer, educate yourself; do not purchase mercury-containing items if a substitute item is available. When an item containing mercury is purchased, dispose of it properly when it becomes waste. Here are some ways you can reduce mercury pollution.

Why Be Concerned?

- Mercury is toxic to the nervous system.
- Unborn children are most at risk from methyl mercury poisoning.

Exposure to extreme levels of mercury can result in shakiness, tremors, numbness in fingers and toes, loss of muscle control, memory loss and kidney disease in children and adults.

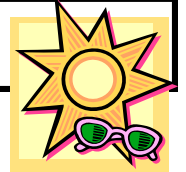
BICYCLE LICENSING

2009 Summer Recreation Program



The Village of Saukville offers a Summer Recreation Program at two park locations in the Village. Physical activities, arts and crafts, and games are offered daily. SEVERE WEATHER SIRENS
